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Lighting for portraiturewith studio lights

(but the same principles apply to using speedlights)

- 1. Split lighting
- 2. Rembrandt lighting
- 3. Broad lighting with and without reflector or fill light

A few more lighting terms

- 1.key light basically your main light
- 2.fill light to brighten up the shadows cast by your key light; often half the output of the key light or you can use
 - a reflector

Camera settings

If no incident light meter:

- make a guesstimate eg f/8 1/125
 ISO 200 to start (manual)
- switch on highlight and shadow warnings
- check your histogram (shoot slightly to right)


Subject

- · avoid 'convict 99' ie straight on
- sitting or standing? props
- stool elongates less 'slouching'
- do you want direct gaze ("look at the camera") or 'windmill hands' & tripod
- pre-set everything and chat for a more natural look and more relaxed subject (but you are not behind the camera so they look at you) with tripod


Background

- subject should be a good distance from background to avoid shadows
- also background will go dark (as flash not reaching it)
- plain wall or curtains (neutral) grey is good and easier to change in post


Difference between direct light and diffused or reflected light




Split lighting - demo



- dramatic
- adjustable with reflector or fill light




Rembrandt lighting - demo



- head shot with triangle on far cheek
- vary dark side with reflector of fill light



Broad lighting - demo



- good for variety of people with same lighting set -up
- good for glasses
- · headshot or full length subject
